So let us confidently approach the throne of grace to receive mercy and to find grace for timely help. (Heb 4:16)

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As I write, we are still under the Governor's executive order to stay home and exercise extreme caution- the COVID-19 virus still is wreaking havoc on our world- filling us with uncertainty and causing pain to many.

The above quotation from Hebrews is traditionally read on Good Friday as part of the Lord's Passion. It seems so timely and appropriate in light of our current situation. So as we pass through this dark night let us together confidently approach that throne of grace for the strength and courage that we need.

Just as the Jewish Passover is celebrated around the family table- let us too celebrate the Christ's Passover from death to life around our family table and therein rediscover its true meaning and joy.

May the Lord bless us all at this time of challenge and crisis! For Christ has risen- he has risen indeed! Happy Easter!
